MoT Exemption for Pre-1960 Cars

Malcolm has received only 17 responses to date, though all express concern about removing the requirement for an MoT on pre-1960 cars. Nick Larkin of *Practical Classics* reports that the French Federation of Historic Vehicles (equivalent of the FBHVC) "can't understand why the British

are doing this. In fact [we've] done the opposite". They feel an inspection would spot defects the owner might not and think it's a good thing for the classic movement in France. Nick points out that it will only take one accident in an MoT free classic and the repercussions will be far-reaching.

Wedding Cars

Proposals for a change of law regarding wedding car hire are looming. They include:

- Each classic car used for wedding hire would have to pass a rigorous private hire car test (i.e. taxi) every six months, overseen by the local authority.
- Cars under private hire rules could only be driven by licensed private hire drivers.
- £2000 Operators Licence for owners.
- Business-use insurance would have to include greater public liability cover.
- All drivers would need to pass a Group 2 Medical Test, the Driving Standards Agency taxi test and a CRB check.

Many who operate a wedding car business or those whose classics are occasionally hired, would be threatened as the demanding stipulations are either unachievable or financially crippling.

Malcolm has sent the following to the Law Commission:

I am writing to express concern as to the recently publicised, potential, changes to the regulations concerning the use of wedding cars.

As classic car owners we like to help family and friends if they want us to use our classic cars at weddings etc. Where possible and within our insurance limitations, we are happy to oblige, but if in future the cars have to meet additional compliance regulations, as for private hire and taxi's, and the drivers undergo enhanced CRB checks, this will not be possible.

Some owners will provide the service for free, or with a payment to charity, others may charge a small fee, but in either case, any enhanced legislation and costs could lead to a service which brings pleasure to many people, being lost, through what would seem to be ever increasing legislation for no good reason.

I hope that the proposed changes will enable exemption for classic/vintage cars used in weddings and also funerals.
